

How Everyone is Important

Alone, it is always hard to do a lot of work. Sharing work with others brings in new perspectives, a faster way to get to a goal, new ideas and much more.

With the example of the Project "Safe Space Munich" I want to explain why every member is important.

Everyone has something, that is his best ability. So that means that you are a specialist in the thing that you can do best.

When every member shares his ability, we can build up a great network of knowledge and experience.

<u>The example:</u>

So there are a total of 26 members. Let's say we have only one person per special ability. (All triangles have different colours, each colour representing one special ability.)

If we needed a doctor now, everyone would need to rely on that this member is available.



Advantages for a big network:

- + Flexibility: relying on more specialists (for example more doctors) brings more flexibility, for Starfleet and for every member (if someone is not available, simply another doctor is available, having more doctors, means that every doctor needs to do only a part of work, as the work assigned to a doctor is simply shared with every other specialist, this makes it possible that Starfleet is running, and every member has to do only a little work because many little works come to a big goal)
 - ...and still make it possible that everyone is important, as everyone is actively doing something even when it is only a little work, and without little work, no big goals can be achieved.
- **+ Money**: a bigger network brings in more money, which is also crucial for our mid- and long-term goals of course.
